

Theme
History – An Essay on Progress

May 8<sup>th</sup> 2005, we celebrated VE day's 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary. I hope you took time to reflect on this occasion. And like me, your reflections may have concluded that "Peace" has a much different meaning today than it did in 1945.

For a long while, we thought "Peace" meant "absence of war" and we used to think that this was not sufficient. In the sixties, we wanted "Peace" to mean "Love" and "Sharing" and "Compassion" towards all humanity. But our 60s hippies became our 80s yuppies and chants of "Peace and Love" were quickly replaced with concerns over "Bull and Bear" markets.

Today, we live in an Orwellian time, where war is peace and peace is war. The American people have grown to accept the financial costs of questionable wars and they've accepted the horrors of war, and they are no longer concerned with the sight of body bags and weeping mothers. It all seems to make sense because of 9/11.

But as we are spending billions of dollars every year to fight wars in Iraq, Afghanistan and coming soon to a theater of operations near you: Iran. We are not investing in our future. Instead we are accelerating the pace at which we are depleting our finite resources and using them for destruction instead of growth. Let's stop fighting over oil and start finding solutions that do not rely on cheap abundant oil.

As an environmentalist and a humanist, I am very concerned with the future of our world. David Suzuki has been treated by the media and the politicos as a fringe radical with his message of environmental responsibility; the truth is that Suzuki was probably sugar-coating his message so the CBC execs would continue to fund his show. We are facing an environmental catastrophe. The melting icebergs will radically affect our climates; Europe will have much colder winters, North America will experience much warmer summers, the oceans will be much more violent causing more Tsunamis. And yet, the media continue to focus on the Jackson trial, same-sex marriage, Gomery, the in-fighting on Desperate Housewives and Georgia's runaway bride! We are facing serious problems in this country and around the world and we need serious politicians who'll have the fortitude to implement the harsh solutions that will be required.

Ronald Wright, author of "A Short History of Progress", noted that Man is the only animal who is more driven by cultural needs than by survival needs. This means that our hunting and gathering ancestors have evolved to a point where the whole world has become a protein buffet for humans and we no longer need to concern ourselves with the menial tasks of finding food and shelter. The Maoris refer to this as the "Great Forgetting" when Man began to take its environment for granted and stopped managing population growth. This phenomenon was experienced worldwide at around the same time. Here in North America, the Indians lived off the land and they mostly did so responsibly. When they would hunt the buffaloes with spears and arrows, they managed the resources well. When they learned to drive entire herds over a cliff: that was too much progress. Technology has obviously evolved much faster than we could handle it. But will we have the fortitude to make the sacrifices necessary to make our continued life on earth sustainable?

What can we do? ASHRAE President Bill Coad called on us to do the right thing now. He said (I paraphrase): *let's design and construct buildings that use less energy and resources as a matter of course, not just because it makes sense economically.* We need to be leaders in our fields. Bill Coad delivered a powerful message at our May meeting in 2001; his words moved me and I promised myself that I would do something about this. Many people talk about the weather but so few do anything about it... well guess what folks, you are actually in a position to do something about it. >

> How many Ottawa Valley ASHRAE members will have read this article? And then, how many of you will change your behaviour as a result of reading this article? Probably none. But I consider it my duty to let you know that action is needed. We cannot continue as we have. At the very, very least: insist on designing to ASHRAE 90.1, 2001 even if it's not part of the code yet.

Bill Clinton used to have a sign in the oval office that read: it's the economy, stupid! I have similar sign, it says: it's the environment, stupid! What does your sign say?

Did our grandfathers die fighting fascism in vain? Only to have us progress and prosper to an early extinction? We have witnessed many civilizations' extinction... we are repeating history at a faster pace but this time the extinction may not be limited to an unlucky percentage of the earth's population. You do the math.


I would like to thank all of those who participated in the Chapter Technology Awards this year, and to offer congratulations to the award winners identified above.

Subash Vohra, P.Eng. ASHRAE Society Life Member by Robert Kilpatrick



At the April meeting, a long standing member of our chapter, Subash Vohra, was recognized as an ASHRAE Society lifetime member and presented with a lifetime certificate by Frank Bann, an Ottawa Valley chapter past-president, and current Region II vice-chair, Membership Promotion.

Subash holds degrees in Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering from Punjab University, India.

As well as being a member of ASHRAE, he is also a member of the Professional Engineers of Ontario (PEO), and the International Facilities Management Association (IFMA).

Subash worked in Germany from 1962 to 1964, after which he came to Canada and worked with a consulting engineering firm in Montreal until August 1966. In September of that year, he moved to Ottawa, where he joined the National Research Council as a mechanical engineer in Plant Engineering Services.

Over the course of his career at NRC, he has held a number of positions of increasing responsibility, including serving for 10 years as Director, Engineering and Maintenance, and finally his current position as Director General of the Administrative Services and Property Management Branch of the NRC, which he has held since 1997.

Subash joined ASHRAE Society in 1967, and became a member of the Ottawa Valley Chapter in the early 1970's.

Until recent years, Subash has been a very active member of our chapter, attending the monthly meetings on a regular basis, and serving on various committees over the years, as well as serving several years on the Board of Governors between 1977 and 1980.

Subash has been recognized in the engineering community for his leadership and contribution to energy management that resulted in NRC being named as "A Pioneer in Energy Efficiency".

Some of his projects have been considered models in the public and the private sector. He is the recipient of the first Federal Energy Innovation Award, the Treasury Board Award for Leadership in the Federal Real Property Community, the Ontario Hydro's Energy Efficiency Award, ASHRAE Technology Awards, the Governor General of Canada's Medal for Contributions to Canada and the Queen's Golden Jubilee Medal.
